# Message From the CEO



On behalf of the Board of Directors and management of the Association for Choices in Community Supports and Employment Services (ACCSES New Jersey), I am pleased to present this 2019 Annual Report on our achievements and operations. Our mission is to provide leadership and support to members that advocate for and serve persons with disabilities through community-based programs located throughout New Jersey. We exercised this role for 41 member and affiliate organizations in 2019.

The end of 2019 marked three years for me at the helm of ACCSES NJ. In addition to building on the initiatives launched over the last two years, we placed more emphasis this year on training, compliance, advocacy, quality assurance and improving communication with our partners at the New Jersey Division of Purchase and Property, DVRS and other state agencies. We continued to modernize the organization with enhanced online technical capabilities and marketing techniques, initiatives that will benefit our members and customers. Among the major steps that enabled our progress in these areas were bringing on board a CFO/Compliance Officer and a Vice President of Business Development. We also stepped-up our advocacy/public policy efforts, resulting in more consistent funding for jobs and services for people with disabilities.

ACCSES New Jersey operates the State of New Jersey's Set-Aside Program for Rehabilitation Facilities, the primary purpose of which is to create jobs for people with disabilities. The program enables the setaside of designated commodities and services to be sold to state, county and municipal government units and their related entities on a sole-provider basis by a Central Non-Profit Agency (CNA). We have served in that role since 1984. I am pleased to report that 2019 was a successful year for the program. Wages paid during the year amounted to \$8,944,049, with an average hourly wage of \$12.15. Individuals with disabilities put in 740,505 hours of work. We intensified our effort to increase Set-Aside Program online sales, resulting in \$112,783 of online Set-Aside business. Commodities and Services Council Chairperson Roger Pearly has more information on the Set-Aside in his letter in this Annual Report. The advances we made in 2019 will enable ACCSES NJ to optimize our value to our membership and provide greater employment opportunities for people with disabilities. I am pleased with our progress and optimistic about the outlook for the years ahead.

- Expanded our social media campaign to raise awareness of the need for more job opportunities for the population we serve.
- · Bolstered our comprehensive training program.

I am confident that the progress we made in 2019 will enable us to continue adding value to and amplifying our work on behalf of people with disabilities.

# Message From the Commodities & Services Council Chair

#### Dear Commissioner Johnson:

Enclosed please find the 2019 Annual Report for the State of New Jersey's Set-Aside Program for Rehabilitation Facilities, which was prepared for the Commodities and Services Council (CSC) by ACCSES New Jersey (Association for Choices in Community Supports and Employment Services), which has been operating the program since 1984 as the state's Central Non-Profit Agency. The CSC oversees their management of the Set Aside.

ACCSES NJ worked closely with the state and made strong efforts with counties, municipalities, school districts and quasi-government entities in 2019 to fulfill the Set-Aside's purpose of providing jobs and related services to people with disabilities. The year was highly successful in that regard:

- · Workers with disabilities logged 740,505 productive hours through the program at an average hourly wage of \$12.15;
- The hours worked by people with disabilities amounted to 80.8 percent of all direct labor hours worked in the program (The minimum requirement is 75 percent).
- $\cdot$  The number of workers with disabilities in the program reached an all-time high at 1,593.

The Council thanks Governor Phil Murphy and his administration for strong support of good jobs for citizens with disabilities. New Jersey's investment in the program provides a substantial return to the state:

- The jobs reduce entitlement expenses and generate tax revenue from each person with a disability who is put to work;
- · A typical job in the community is estimated to produce a \$4,745 annual impact, including taxes paid and reduced assistance;
- Every dollar spent in the set-aside program resulted in money being injected into local economies.

I am pleased to report significant improvement in ACCSES NJ's sharing of data with the CSC, including results of janitorial work inspections. ACCSES NJ brought workers with disabilities to two of our meetings during the year, and it was valuable for Council members to hear directly from them about the importance of their jobs and the positive impact on their lives.

The year 2020 will present many new challenges, with accompanying opportunities. With your support, the CSC believes we can continue to grow the Set-Aside Program and provide additional job opportunities for New Jersey citizens with disabilities.






## 2019 State Use Program Sales By Type

Sales & Financial Report




### % of 2019 Sales Commodities vs Services






## 2019 Wages paid for the State Use Program

# ACCSES NJ Training Program Highlights

In 2019, ACCSES NJ continued to expand the CITS training program to provide credentials to front line workers in various aspects of providing quality janitorial services. We also grew our program to include more personal and professional development sessions for our members.

ACCSES NJ provided a total of 5,496 hours of training to 989 individuals in 2019 through a combination of live and virtual sessions. Most of the training hours were spent in live sessions, however, we started a virtual series of weekly "Lunch and Learn" sessions covering 38 different topics. 295 people attended the virtual sessions for a total 362 hours of training. ACCSES NJ is committed to professional development and we plan on continuing to explore new avenues of training during 2020.









# 3rd Annual STAR Conference Oct-2019

In 2019, we held our 3rd annual STAR conference, a two-day event that featured over 216 attendees and an inspiring Keynote Speaker, Paul Aronsohn, from the New Jersey Ombudsman for Individuals with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities and Their Families. We continued our STAR awards to recognize outstanding achievements of our consumers throughout the program. The conference featured 24 training sessions , 46 presenters and a total of 529.50 training hours. Training sessions categories included Policy and Advocacy, Leadership, Business Development, and Operations. The conference was highlighted with the addition of a Centennial Luncheon celebrating NJ DVRS.









